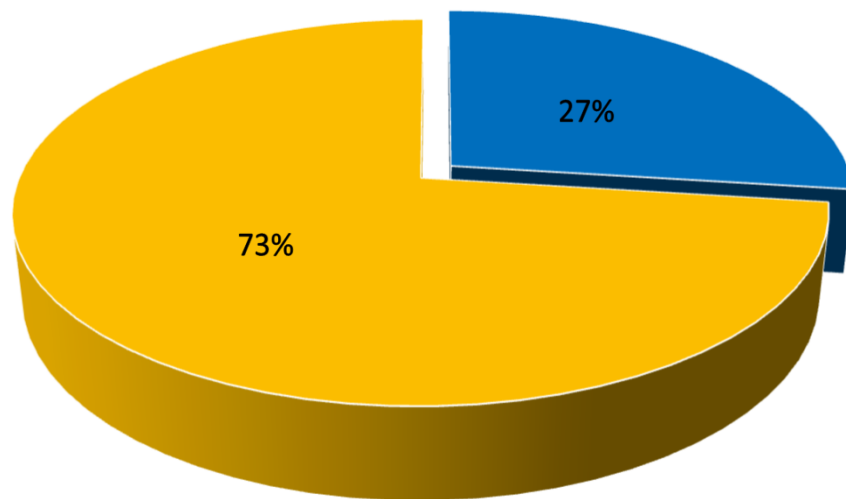

PUBLIC SAFETY

Los Angeles County 2017



In 2017, 27% of the 688 people shot or seriously injured by police in Los Angeles County were African American.

In 2019, African American women were only 9% of women in LA County but 30% of jail bookings were women.

Data about disproportional use of force on African-Americans by the Sheriff's Department—whether separated out by in-custody or out of custody over a five-year period (or any five-year period)—is not readily available from any entity within the County: Sheriff, Civilian Oversight Commission, or Office of Inspector General.

EDUCATION

African American girls make up 16 percent of girls in schools, yet comprise:

- 42 percent of girls expelled with or without educational services;
- 24 percent of girls arrested on campus.

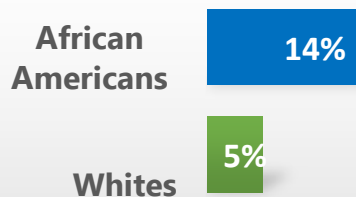
Black students are punished more harshly than white students in schools even when black and white students engage in identical or similar behavior.

HEALTH

African American women are 3 to 4 times more likely to die of complications from pregnancy than non-Hispanic white women.

“Gig Work” in the last year

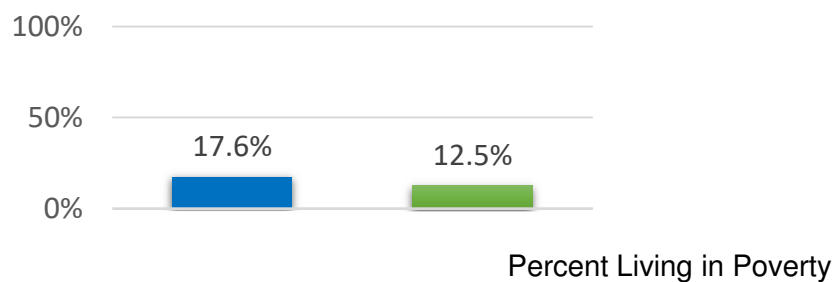


“Gig Work” as primary source of income

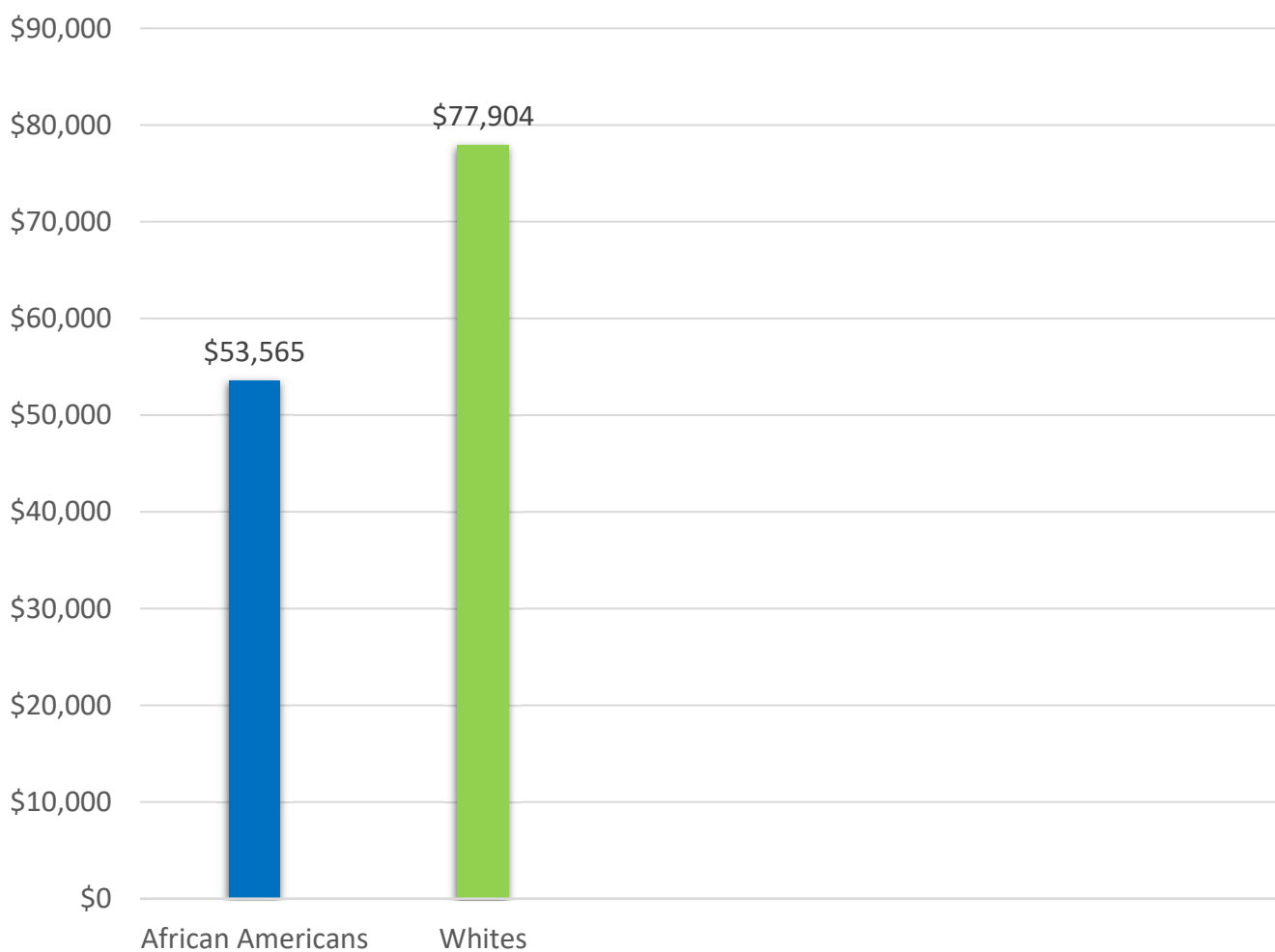

2017 California Poverty Measure



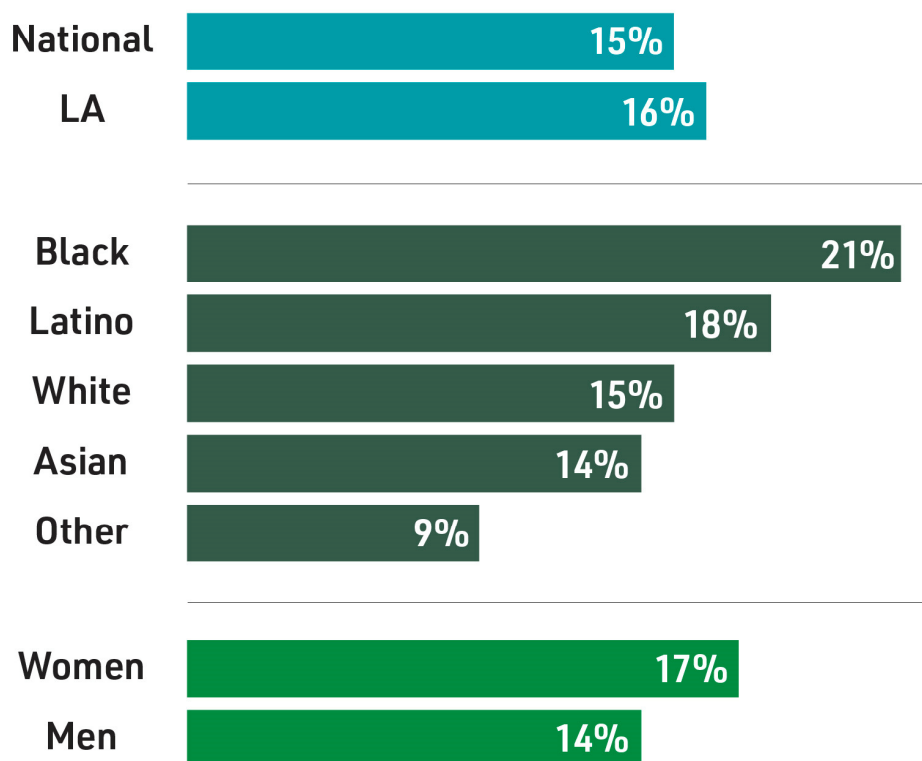
2018 Household Median Income



Understanding Coronavirus in America

A total of 5,477 adult members of the Understanding Coronavirus in America tracking survey participated in the online survey between March 1 – 14, 2020. The sample included 1,080 residents of Los Angeles County. Participants were members of USC Dornsife Center for Economic and Social Research's Understanding America Study, a probability-based online survey panel recruited using address-based sampling. Margin of sampling error is +/- 2 percentage points for the national sample, and +/- 4 for LA County. More information at Covid19Pulse.USC.edu
